Expository Essay –	A Positive Relationship

Writing Prompt

Who is a human being you have known who has <u>had a positive impact</u> on you or who has <u>made a positive difference</u> in your life? Choose <u>one person</u>—someone whom you have known personally—to write about.

In an organized and well-developed 5-paragraph essay, *bring this person to life* for the reader by (1) capturing the most important aspects of this person's *character*, AND (2) explaining how your relationship with this person has had a positive *impact* on you.

Requirements

- 1) Content & Focus Address <u>all parts of the prompt</u> in your essay, communicating both <u>the most important aspects of this person's *character* and how this relationship has had <u>a positive *impact*</u> on you.</u>
- **2) Organization** Organize your ideas and supporting details effectively into an essay with the following parts:
 - An engaging introduction that makes clear your essay's thesis and main ideas
 - Three body paragraphs, each of which fully develops a main idea with evidence, clearly-explained reasoning, and smooth transitions,
 - An effective **conclusion**.
- 3) Elaboration & Development Throughout the body of your essay, use at least the first four strategies listed below to capture the person's character and to explain the person's impact on you:
 - **Description** use <u>concrete sensory language</u> to paint a picture for the reader
 - Anecdote incorporate a brief and interesting story to make a point
 - **Quotation** incorporate <u>a meaningful and relevant statement</u> (either something said by the person you're writing about, or something said by an expert on the topic)
 - Example provide <u>specific</u>, <u>concrete information</u> to illustrate a general, abstract idea
 - Facts & Statistics provide <u>numbers</u>, figures, or data that illustrate your main idea

4) Other Requirements

Style & Voice: Use a **first-person** perspective, as well as language and a tone that fit your attitude toward this person.

Length: Your essay should contain **no fewer than 700 words**—which is equivalent to roughly 2½ pages, based on using MLA format as described below.

Format: Use MLA format: typed, **double-spaced** throughout with **no extra spaces** anywhere, properly headed and paginated, with **1-inch margins on all sides**, written in **12-point Times New Roman** font or a comparable-sized font.

Correctness: Make sure your writing is **completely free of careless errors**.
