Grammar Handout 7: The Comma Splice (CS)

A **comma splice** (abbreviated CS) is <u>a type of run-on sentence</u> in which two independent clauses—or two complete sentences—<u>are joined incorrectly by only a comma</u>. Writers usually make this mistake because the two independent clauses are <u>related</u> to each other.

Question: Why is it a mistake to join two complete sentences with only a comma?

Answer: A comma is <u>not strong enough</u> to join 2 sentences by itself.

Example of a Comma Splice

Today I am tired, I will take a nap later.

This example is a comma splice because it has two related independent clauses (or complete sentences) incorrectly joined by <u>only</u> a comma.

Reasoning: The first part of the sentence ("Today I am tired") is an independent clause or complete sentence, and the second part ("I will take a nap later") is also an independent clause or complete sentence. The two sentences need to be joined by more than just a comma because a comma is **not strong enough!!!**

How to Fix a Comma Splice

There are <u>four ways to correct a comma splice</u>, and they are similar to the four ways of correcting a <u>run-on</u>.

1. Replace the comma with a period and make two separate sentences.

Today I am tired . I will take a nap later.

2. Add an appropriate coordinating conjunction (one of the FANBOYS) after the comma.

Today I am tired, so I will take a nap later.

3. Replace the comma with a semicolon (;)

Today I am tired; I will take a nap later.

4. Turn one of the clauses into a <u>subordinate clause</u> (by adding an appropriate <u>subordinating conjunction</u> to the beginning of it).

Since I am tired today, I will take a nap later.

Exercise

Identify and correct the comma splices in the following sentences.

Ex: Ponyboy Curtis is a greaser, he lives in the poor part of town and is harassed by Socs.
